



He was born on March 2, 1904 in Springfield Massachusetts.

Dr. Seuss was not really a doctor.

Dr. Seuss was an author, poet, screenwriter, illustrator, film producer, television producer, songwriter, animator and visual artist.

At the age of 18 Dr. Seuss went to Dartmouth College in New Hampshire.

Dr. Seuss has written and illustrated 44 children's books. His children's books have been translated in over 15 languages.
