## Word Work for Week of Aug. 28

Your child should know to read and write these sight words.: another, don't, kind, put, saw, sound

We will also be working with words that have a magic e pattern (CVCe) . e.g. Cut to cute

Students will also work with multiple meaning words.

## Word Work for Week of Sept. 6

Your child should know to read and write these sight words.: because, done, know, want, together.

## Attendance is Important!

Attendance is important because students are more likely to succeed in school when they attend school consistently. In the early years it is difficult for students to build skills and show progress if a child is frequently absent. Many lessons cannot be put on paper and sent home for a child to make-up.

A 2008 study conducted at Arizona State University tracked students from kindergarten through high school and found that dropout patterns were linked with poor attendance, beginning in kindergarten.


A 1998 study published by the American Psychological Association links reading volume directly with both advancing a student's reading skills and with that child's future academic success.

The key to increasing your child's reading volume is motivation. Choose books that match your child's interest. Or, explore reading with other media your child loves. Is she a fan of princesses? There is a world of online fairy tales for her to explore. Kids who love superheroes can enjoy easy-reader comic books. Don't be too picky about what your child reads at this age. Captain Underpants may be more meaningful than Little House on the Prairie - and that's fine!

Finally, celebrate the fact that you still have a great deal of influence over what your child reads. In a survey commissioned by Scholastic, $81 \%$ of kids ages $5-8$ say that their mom/dad is a source of information for good books.

DAILY: Each child should read for at least 10 minutes each night. Third grade students should read 15-20 minutes. While reading, every child should fill out his or her reading log writing no fewer than 2-3 sentences.

The rest of the week your child will have homework in the following content areas. It is possible on some days that your child will not follow this guide. If many students seem to need more guided practice in class with a particular concept, your child's teacher may choose to not send homework for that night. Homework is always due the following day unless noted by your child's teacher.
